REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD

In many homes, meals begin with grace and end with putting away the leftover food. Those leftovers are either eaten later by someone who missed dinner or added to tomorrow's meals. The meal in today's Gospel is somewhat similar. Before the meal Jesus "gave thanks." After all had eaten he asked that the leftovers be gathered "so that nothing will be wasted" (John 6:11, 12).

It's not a stretch to see the similarity to our Liturgy of the Eucharist, which begins with a prayer of thanksgiving. It ends with the remaining Eucharist being reserved for those who couldn't be present and the "crowd" being sent to share Christ's sacrificial love. It's miraculous enough that all who are present can eat and have their fill. That is something to be truly grateful for. Yet, the miracle extends beyond the table. "The hand of the Lord feeds us" (cf. Psalm 145:16) with leftover love to spare. The abundant "leftovers" are meant not to be wasted, but to be shared with all those in need of Christ's love.

Scripture Insights~

Last's weeks Gospel acted as an introduction to the miracle of the feeding of five thousand. Instead of continuing with the account from Mark's Gospel, the Church has deliberately chosen to read the narrative from John's Gospel. The reason is two-fold: John gives a longer and more detailed description of the miracle. John also offers us an insight into the deeper meaning of this miracle by using specific details to draw attention to symbolism that foreshadows the Eucharist. For the next four weeks we continue to read from John's narrative as we gain a deeper insight into the meaning of the Eucharist.

Jesus, seated on a mountain beside the Sea of Galilee, reminds us of Moses on Mount Sinai. A boy offers Jesus five barley loaves and two fish that Jesus uses to feed the vast crowd. Many of the details of the story remind us of the Eucharist: the miracle occurs just before the second *Passover*. John uses the Greek word *eucharisteo* for "giving thanks" (from which comes the word "Eucharist"). A further interesting point is that the Greek word *klasma* for "fragment" was used in the early Church to refer to the Communion host.

The references to "young boy" (or "servant") and "barley loaves" are details that John deliberately uses to connect to the First Reading today, in which Elisha orders the servant to distribute "the twenty barley loaves." Just as Elisha's miracle reminded the people of God's care for them in the desert by feeding them with manna from heaven, so Jesus' miracle shows the people that God, through his Son, is again feeding his people. By deliberately connecting the description to the Eucharist, John shows that this miracle of nourishing God's people continues today every time the Eucharist is celebrated..

- How do the words that John uses to describe Jesus' actions remind you of the Eucharist?
- Why might the writer of John's Gospel deliberately take up images found in the reading from 2 Kings? Why would the Lectionary place these on the same Sunday?
- How might today's Responsorial Psalm work as a prayer of thanksgiving for the Eucharist?

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Last Wednesday, the greatest pilgrimage in our tradition ended with the feast of Saint James at his shrine in Compostela, Spain. Every year, as many as a hundred thousand persons walk a portion of the medieval way of the pilgrim, earning the right to wear the scallop shell symbol of this journey of faith. In legend, this city on the northern coast of Spain is the final resting place of the apostle, and the full name of the cathedral is "Saint James of the Field of Stars." There is a tradition that Saint James the Great preached there.

In the Roman Catholic tradition, the pilgrimage, like any procession, is a symbol, life's journey distilled, a powerful sign of our journey toward a certain goal. The perils of the road, the support of companions, the contemplative slower pace of life, have the potential to transform and renew the pilgrims in ways that last a lifetime. Along the way, the distinctions between rich and poor fall away, and everyone shares humble rustic food and stops for the night in hostels or under the stars. After a long walk, the experience of entering through the great doors into the vast cathedral filled with incense, light, and song is a foretaste of heaven. The pilgrims often say that their whole lives are redirected toward that moment of entry into the heavenly Jerusalem. The most memorable feature of the cathedral is called the *botofumeiro*, an incense burner on pulleys and chains that sweeps through the cathedral in immense circles, swirling clouds of sweet-smelling incense around the vast nave.
